



When you toss something into the recycling bin, make sure it is **Empty, Clean,** and **Dry!** Plastic bags, wire cords, and hoses don't belong in our recycling bins. These are called "tanglers" because they get tangled up in recycling sorting machinery!

Don't Trash Our Planet!

Recycling is something most of us do at home. We have blue bins just to hold our recyclables. The more we put in recycling, the less goes in trash. Recycling is when something new is made from something that has already been used once. When things go in the blue bin, they go to be made into new things. That saves valuable natural resources as most things we use are grown or mined from the earth. It also saves energy. It usually takes less energy to make something from old materials than it does from new.

Recycling right is as important as recycling. If you put the wrong thing in the blue bin, it does make a difference. Too many wrong things in the recycle bin cause problems when those materials are sorted to be sold and made into new things. That leads to higher costs for the service. And, the things that don't belong end up in the trash any way so it is better to put them there from the start. 

A waste audit is a way to study the items your household throws away. There is a lot we can learn from studying your own garbage. Follow these steps and see how you can reduce your home's garbage.

do an at-home waste aud

Steps:


1. For one day, make sure everyone throws their garbage into a specific trash can, including things that you think may be recyclable (icky things like band-aids and tissues don't need to be included!)

2. The next day, empty out the trash onto a tarp in your backyard.

3. Wearing gloves, sort the trash into different categories (like food waste, plastics, cardboard, etc.).

4. Using your eyes, "guesstimate" the percentage of garbage that each category makes up. Remember, the total amount of garbage is 100%. Draw a pie chart (in the circle provided) to show your findinas.

5. Once you have recorded your data, you can clean up by putting recyclables in the recycling bin, non-recyclables in the garbage can, and compostable scraps in a compost bin if your house has one. Take your gloves off and wash your hands!



Think about the types of garbage you found in your waste audit. Was it surprising to see the amount of waste your household makes in one day? Brainstorm some ways that you could produce less garbage, and share those ideas with your family!
